# **Maestro Steering Committee**

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The Maestro Steering Committee governs Maestro (Modular Application for the Electronic Submission and Tracking of Research Operations), which is an enterprise-wide system that supports researchers and research administration across The Texas A&M University System. The Steering Committee is co-chaired by the TAMUS CIO (Mark Stone) and the TAMU interim VP for Research (Jack Baldauf). The Maestro Steering Committee met on Wednesday, March 9, 2022. Items of discussion included:

I. Budget Forecasting Update – A. Budget Entry (presented by Tamara Lopez). The Budget Entry module has been released to production. Budget Administrators can enter awarded budgets on established accounts. Highlights: (i) allows entry to individual accounts by budget categories based on awarded proposal budget; (ii) allows entry on the individual funding periods or combined; (iii) option to perform a prorate function; (iv) includes personnel detail for salary and

fringe; and (v) allows administrators to route budget entry document for approval and automatically post budget to financial system (e.g. FAMIS) from Maestro. Other functionality for Sponsored Budget vs. Financial budget (piece going to FAMIS) was discussed. A Budget Entry Demo was provided. **B. Budget Forecasting (presented by Mohammad Al-Banna).** Briefly discussed were: main dashboard, portfolio management, detailed personnel forecast, summary forecast for other budget categories and IDC projection, forecast versioning, and security and forecast sharing with designated users based on roles. A timeline for tasks within the large Budget Forecasting project was presented.

- II. Cost Sharing Module (presented by Crystal Foy). Phase 1 of the Cost Share module includes: (i) Cost Share Requirements Entry screen on Billing Project level; (ii) Cost Share Transaction Entry screen; (iii) automated import of cost share financial transactions; (iv) automated calculation of unrecovered IDC on research and cost share projects; (v) automated Sponsor Cost Share reports generation; and (vi) Cost Share search screen. Phase 2 includes (i) automated notification as reminder to create a required cost share report and enabled report certification process; (ii) Administrative Dashboard statistics; and (iii) specialized departmental reports that would include cost share encumbrances. Phase 1 is in the process of being implemented, with production release on April 8; the implementation steps were detailed. A Cost Sharing Demo was provided
- III. Maestro Migration to Oracle Cloud Infrastructure OCI (presented by Donovan Sherriffs). Highlights: (i) current contract for Oracle Cloud at Customer hardware expiring, both College Station and Austin; (ii) OCI has lower cost and faster hardware, allows work from anywhere and cost is based on usage; (iii) all available Oracle cloud services are included in contract; (iv) large project due to upgrade of Operating System, and connectivity; (v) each hardware migration must be completed in 4 months or we will pay for two sets of hardware. This is a TAMUS contract, but Maestro will be a major user.
- IV. Status Monitoring Report (presented by Leonarda Horvat). Maestro is being used by all System members. Major projects that are ongoing or recently completed include Budget Module, Cost Sharing Module, Maestro Evolution Module (discussed in report on November 2021 Steering Committee meeting), and Infrastructure Move to Oracle Cloud.

# NIH Data Management Updates

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## I. <u>New NIH Website on Scientific Data Sharing</u>

#### II. Reminder of New NIH Data Management and Sharing Plan Policy

Be prepared for the new NIH policy on Data Management and sharing that is effective for <u>applications</u> <u>submitted on January 25, 2023 and after</u>. Beginning on this date NIH will require researchers to submit a data management plan as part of their application. The plan will be part of the budget justification section of the proposal and will be limited to <u>two pages or less</u>.

Under NIH's current 2003 Data Sharing policy, investigators are expected to:

- Include a data sharing plan in research proposals seeking \$500,000 or more per year in direct costs describing how final research data will be shared. Alternatively, the investigator is expected to explain why data sharing is not possible.
- **Release and share the data**, as described in the approved application, no later than the acceptance for publication of the main findings from the final dataset.
- **Report any progress** made on data sharing progress in the annual submission of their <u>Research Progress Performance Report (RPPR)</u>

# **Guidance on Salary Limitation for NIH Awards**

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NIH announcement NOT-OD-22-076 released on February 10, 2022 provides guidance on the salary cap on NIH awards which is limited to the current Executive Level II of the Federal Executive Pay Scale. At this time, NIH has not received an FY 2022 appropriation and is operating under a Continuing Resolution that applies the terms and conditions of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021.

The Office of Personnel Management released new salary levels for the Executive Pay Scale and effective January 2, 2022, the salary limitation for Executive Level II is \$203,700.

Grant applicants and contract offerors can use the new salary limitation for Executive Level II of \$203,700 when preparing grant applications and contract proposals. Recipients may rebudget funds to accommodate the current Executive Level II salary level if adequate funds are available in active awards and the salary cap increase is consistent with the institutional base salary.

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# From NIH OLAW: Topics from advancements in refinements to experimental strategies to improve welfare and sound science to successful 3Rs collaborations – June 22-24, 2022 | Hybrid

NIH OLAW, Johns Hopkins University Center for Alternatives to Animal Testing, USDA AWIC, and Johns Hopkins University Department of Molecular and Comparative Pathobiology are presenting the 9<sup>th</sup> Annual 3Rs Symposium: Collaboration to Improve Animal Welfare and Rigorous Results highlighting the interplay of 3Rs implementation, scientific rigor, and animal welfare to achieve better wellbeing and robust research results. The 3-day symposium includes presentations and panel discussions from biomedical researchers, animal welfare scientists, veterinarians, and animal care experts. The final day features a demonstration of refinement techniques. The conference also incorporates breakout sessions where participants can converse with and pose questions to the speakers.

This workshop has applied for RACE credits and offers reduced registration for federal workers, postdocs, and students. #### Laboratory Decommissioning

Laboratories must be decommissioned in accordance with the University SAP for <u>Laboratory Decommissioning</u> (24.01.01.M4.04). Decommissioning is required for any laboratory space when the principal investigator (PI) is 1) leaving Texas A&M University, 2) moving to another building on campus, 3) relocating to another laboratory within the same building, or 4) removing specific hazards (e.g., radiological, lasers, biological). Decommissioning is also required for laboratory spaces undergoing renovation or if another researcher is assuming responsibility for the space.

To streamline the process and ensure the appropriate safety offices are notified, the Office of Biosafety (OBS) has implemented a simple form that can be utilized by PIs (or designee) to notify OBS and Environmental Health and Safety (EHS) simultaneously. Upon submission, both EHS and OBS will receive an e-mail notification and will each communicate further instructions. PIs are still responsible for amending or terminating their IBC permits, but no longer need to contact EHS and OBS individually in order to fulfill the responsibilities outlined in the SAP.

The <u>Decommissioning Form</u> can be accessed directly from the hyperlink or from the "Closing or Moving Labs" tab on the biosafety website (Closing or Moving Labs – Division of Research (tamu.edu).

#### AAALAC Site Visit Tip for Success – Validation of Sanitation Effectiveness

In preparation for the 2023 AAALAC International site visit, the Animal Welfare Program offers the following tip for PIs who hand wash items with repeated direct animal contact:

To assist the PI in meeting the sanitation and validation standards for this type of item as described in the *Guide for the Care and Use of Laboratory Animals*, the IACUC has established Guidance TAMU-G-026 *IACUC Guidelines for the Evaluation of Sanitation Practices*. In an effort to decrease PI burden in meeting these guidelines, the Comparative Medicine Program (CMP) has developed standard operating procedures (SOPs) for various sanitation methodologies which may be adopted; eliminating the need for the PI to independently develop their own SOPs or validate the effectiveness of sanitation performed in the lab. A copy of the CMP sanitation SOPs may be requested from CMP by emailing <u>comparativemedicine@tamu.edu</u> or by contacting the Animal Welfare Office.

#### **Student Organization Activities with Animals**

Activities with live vertebrate animals performed by TAMU students during sanctioned Student Organization events may need be reviewed and approved by the Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC). Faculty advisors for Student Organizations are encouraged to consult with the Animal Welfare Office when such activities are planned to ensure appropriate IACUC oversight. The **Graduate Recruitment, Enhancement, and Travel (GREAT) Program provides supplemental funding** to eligible: (i) nationally competitive external fellowships awarded to students, (ii) federal training grant fellowships awarded to faculty or departments, and (iii) federal research grant supplements awarded to faculty to promote diversity. Also, the **GREAT program provides travel awards** for faculty to bring high-achieving prospective doctoral students to campus who may have received or would be competitive for nationally competitive external fellowships. The goal of this program is to elevate Texas A&M's national competitiveness in attracting high achieving students.

## **GRADUATE SUPPLEMENTS**

Doctoral students, faculty, and graduate programs are strongly encouraged to seek funding from sources external to Texas A&M University. Annual graduate "top-off" supplements will be provided to encourage this activity and amplify its impact. The goal of the supplements is to provide a full funding package for eligible nationally competitive dissertation and multi-year external fellowships, federal training grants, and federal research grant supplements promoting diversity. A <u>full funding package annually includes</u> a monthly stipend of at least \$3,000 per month or up to the monthly amount of the fellowship/training grant stipend if greater than \$3,000 per month, funding for full tuition and required university and college fees, 12 months of student health insurance, and a \$1,500 scholarship for professional development opportunities, conference travel, research travel, books, etc.

# **Doctoral Student Expectations:**

Doctoral students receiving the supplements must participate in research leadership (e.g., Aggie Research Program) and mentoring (e.g., TAMU Graduate Mentoring Academy) development programs.

# Faculty/ Research Advisor Expectations:

Faculty / Research advisors will be strongly encouraged to participate in the TAMU Graduate Mentoring Academy or the TAMU Faculty Mentoring Academy program.

# Category I: Supplements for external fellowships awarded directly to individual students

When Texas A&M doctoral students compete successfully for highly competitive external fellowships like the National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellowship (GRFP), National Institutes of Health F31 Predoctoral Fellowship, and Ford Foundation Dissertation Fellowship, the graduate supplements will provide <u>full funding packages</u> for up to five years.

Supplements will fund **external fellowships** as described below:

- Is a nationally competitive, prestigious fellowship which is open to students in multiple fields or a single field of study.
- Dissertation fellowships one to two years, significant funding (at least \$2,000/month)
- Other fellowships typically multi-year, significant funding (at least \$2,000/month)

Contact the Texas A&M University Graduate and Professional School to discuss possible eligibility of an external fellowship that is not included on the list.

Funding conditions:

- For external fellowships with five years of stipend funding, the supplements will top off fellowship funding to ensure the fellowship recipient receives a full funding package for up to five years.
- For multi-year external fellowships with less than five years of stipend funding, the supplements will top off fellowship funding in years of active fellowship funding, and faculty, department, or college assistantship or fellowship funding in other years to ensure the fellowship recipient receives a full funding package for up to five years.

• For one- to two-year dissertation fellowships, the supplements will top off fellowship funding to ensure the fellowship recipient receives a full funding package for the duration of the fellowship tenure.

# Category II: Supplements for federal training grants awarded to faculty or graduate programs

When faculty or graduate programs compete successfully for federal training grants like National Institutes of Health (NIH) T32 predoctoral training grant, Department of Education (DoE) Graduate Assistance in Areas of National Need (GAANN) grant, USDA National Needs Graduate Fellowship (NNF), or National Science Foundation Research Traineeship (NRT), the graduate supplements will ensure the doctoral trainees receive <u>full funding packages</u> for up to five years.

Supplements will top off training grant funding in year(s) of active training grant stipend funding, and faculty, department, or college assistantship or fellowship funding in other years to ensure the training grant recipient receives a full funding package for up to five years.

# Category III: Supplements for federal research grants awarded to faculty to promote diversity

When faculty secure research supplements for federal research grants to promote diversity like the National Institutes of Health (NIH) Research Supplements to Promote Diversity in Health-Related Research (Admin Supp), National Science Foundation MPS Alliances for Graduate Education and the Professoriate: Graduate Research Supplements (AGEP-GRS), or National Science Foundation MPS Graduate Research Supplement for Veterans (MPS-GRSV), the graduate supplements will top off the federal research grant supplement funding to ensure the doctoral recipient receives a <u>full funding package</u> during the years that the student receives the federal research grant supplement funding.

## **RECRUITMENT TRAVEL AWARDS**

To actively recruit prospective doctoral students who have received external fellowships or prospective doctoral students who would be great candidates for nationally competitive external fellowships, the **GREAT program provides** \$1,000 travel awards for faculty to bring such students for campus visits. The prospective doctoral students should be in their last year of undergraduate studies or master's studies.
