## Update from Dr. Robin Page, 2024-2025 CPI Chair

July CPI News - The Council of Principal Investigators Executive Committee (CPI-EC) met on Wednesday, July 2, 2025. The meeting began with a state legislative update and a recap of the 89th State Legislative Session, presented by Ms. Julie Kopycinski, Chief Government Relations Officer, Office of Government Relations, Texas A&M University. For ongoing updates, visit the Office of Government Relations Home Office of Government Relations and recent Federal Policy Changes Federal Policy Changes | Office of Government Relations.

The CPI-EC also discussed Faculty Support Guidance for Grant Issues with Dr. Heather Lench, Senior Associate Provost for Faculty Affairs. A committee is currently developing guidance, and more information will be shared once finalized. Dr. Lench and Dr. Blanca Lupiani, Vice Provost for Faculty Affairs, emphasized that their office is available to support faculty affected by funding disruptions. The committee also received research compliance updates, including ancillary review processes related to human subjects research. Ms. Rojo del Busto, Associate Vice President for Research and Research Compliance Officer, and Ms. Aliese Seawright, Director of the Human Research Protection Program, provided updates and shared a draft handout titled Ancillary Reviews. Once finalized, the document will be available on the compliance website: Research Ancillary Review – Division of Research.

Dr. Joe Elabd, Vice Chancellor for Research, Texas A&M University System, provided a system-wide update. He expressed appreciation for the collaborative efforts of Sponsored Research Services, the Division of Research, and Government and State Relations teams in hosting weekly morning briefings to keep everyone informed on federal and state legislative developments. These updates are critical as they impact the entire system. Dr. Elabd also noted that while most Executive Stop Orders have been addressed, approximately 25 remain unresolved. He concluded with an update on the Chief Innovation Officer search, sharing that a strong applicant pool has been identified, and the top three candidates will be invited to College Station for final interviews.

CPI has almost completed the 2025 annual elections of new and re-elected CPI Representatives. CPI is still in the process of electing the new 2025-2026 CPI Vice Chair. Elections will be finalized for the CPI Vice Chair later this month. CPI is very pleased with the number of Principal Investigators that accepted nominations, and our thanks go out to all who contended for a seat. Congratulations to all who were elected or re-elected. # Pre-Approval Requests (PARs) Required for External Professional Employment & Consulting

This is a friendly reminder that Pre-Approval Requests (PARs) are required for activities that fall under A&M System Regulations 31.05.01 Faculty Consulting and/or External Professional Employment (University Rule 31.05.01.M1 Faculty Consulting and/or External Professional Employment) and 31.05.02 External Employment. Using the Huron Research Suite, a PAR must be submitted and approved prior to commencement of the activity. Pursuant to the referenced regulations, PARs are valid for one fiscal year and must be resubmitted each year for ongoing activities.

# **Executive Order GA-48 Update**

Governor Abbott issued Executive Order GA-48 on November 19, 2024, "relating to the hardening of state government." Under this order, State agencies and institutions of higher education, including Texas A&M University, are required to implement measures to safeguard state infrastructure and assets from threats posed by specific foreign entities. Currently, this applies to China, Cuba, Iran, North Korea, Russia, and the Maduro Regime of Venezuela. Restrictions were placed on certain activities, such as gifts, professional travel, and participation in foreign recruitment programs. Furthermore, the order requires personal travel notifications for travel to a foreign adversary nation and the establishment of minimum qualifications for critical infrastructure positions. # National Science Foundation (NSF) Research Security Training Deadline -October 10, 2025

Those researchers who will be submitting National Science Foundation (NSF) proposals on or after October 10, 2025 are required to complete research security training PRIOR to proposal submission. This applies to all senior/key personnel on the proposal. To meet this requirement, course 2114875: Research Security Training (Combined) is now available in TrainTrag and will meet this requirement; however, if you have previously taken all four National Science Foundation (NSF) training modules (TrainTrag courses 2114744 NSF Introduction to Research Security; 2114745 NSF The Importance of Disclosure; 2114746 NSF Manage & Mitigate Risk; and 2114747 NSF The Value of International Collaboration) within 12 months of proposal submission, please know that this will also meet NSF's training requirement.

Please also note that NSF requires proposers to maintain supporting documentation, including copies of contracts, grants, or any other agreements specific to foreign appointments, employment with a foreign institution, participation in a foreign talent recruitment program and other information reported as current and pending (other) support for all senior/key personnel and it must be made available to NSF upon request.

As a friendly reminder, research security training has already been required for Covered Individuals submitting Department of Energy (DOE) proposals on or after May 1, 2025.

#### Update to Institutional Review Board (IRB) Protocol Templates

As part of the Ancillary Review Working Group's efforts to enhance investigator awareness of research requirements managed by offices outside of the IRB and to improve research review timelines, the Human Research Protection Program (HRPP) has updated IRB Protocol Templates.

The updated Biomedical, Social & Behavioral and Exempt protocol templates now ask specific questions about information technology use and related security measures as well as questions that provide greater detail about the access and use of student information governed by FERPA. The additional protocol sections are in an easy-to-use format designed to minimize the "back and forth" scenario that often occurs during the review process.

#### **OBSERVE Guidelines for In Vivo Cancer Studies**

A consensus statement regarding Oncology Best-practices: Signs, Endpoints, and Refinements for in Vivo Experiments has been published in a recent issue of Nature Protocols. This statement addresses appropriate study design and animal welfare concerns related to in vivo cancer studies and provides a detailed treatise of the OBSERVE guidelines. The Animal Welfare Office is committed to facilitating the refinement of study methods to improve animal welfare. # Federal Requirement to Review Funded or Unfunded Research Activities or Collaborations Potentially Meeting the Definition of Dangerous Gain of Function

On May 5, 2025 President Trump issued an Executive Order titled "Improving the Safety and Security of Biological Research," mandating stricter oversight of research that could increase the harmful potential of pathogens or toxins. In response, the NIH issued interim guidance confirming that policies, actions, and definitions from the Executive Order supersede the imminent implementation of NIH's 2024 DURC/PEPP policy. Institutions were required to proactively review ongoing research activities to identify any dangerous gain-of-function research not previously reported to NIH, and to immediately notify the relevant NIH Institute.

The Office of Biosafety, in coordination with the Institutional Biosafety Committee, has taken the following steps to ensure compliance with these requirements:

- All IBC-permitted PIs received a one-time TrainTrag assignment titled "Assessing Current Research for Compliance with the 2024 U.S. Policy on DURC and PEPP." While initially designed to ensure compliance with the 2024 DURC/PEPP Policy, this assessment was intentionally written to meet any expanded definitions in future policies and remains pertinent for verifying that research does not fall under prohibited categories.
- All assessments with affirmative answers were reviewed by the Office of Biosafety staff, and the Pls were contacted for clarification.
- The questions were integrated into the current IBC application, enabling both the PI and the Texas A&M IBC to conduct ongoing assessments of the research, as required by the federal government.
- We have completed the required review of ongoing research activities to identify any funded or unfunded projects or collaborations that meet or have the potential to meet the definition of dangerous gain-of-function research.

# New Requirement for Federally Funded Institutions When Purchasing Synthetic Nucleic Acids/Equipment

The Texas A&M University IBC requires that all researchers order synthetic nucleic acids or purchase nucleic acid synthesis equipment exclusively from companies that screen for sequences of concern and potential misuse. This requirement is a preliminary step in response to the Presidential Executive Order "Improving the Safety and Security of Biological Research," which instructs agency heads funding lifesciences research to ensure that synthetic nucleic acid procurement is conducted through providers or manufacturers that adhere to defined screening mechanisms. A federal policy formalizing these requirements is expected within 90 days of the Executive Order, and compliance will be mandatory for institutions that receive federal research funding. ## Promoting Maximal Transparency Under the NIH Guidelines for Research Involving Recombinant or Synthetic Nucleic Acid Molecules

On March 28, the NIH published an announcement that includes the following requirements that are designed to meet the transparency aims of the NIH Guidelines. Effective June 1, 2025:

- The NIH Office of Science Policy (OSP) publicly posted the rosters of all active IBCs registered with OSP online. These rosters will include all members identified by name and role on the committee, plus email addresses for the IBC Chair, Biological Safety Officer, and IBC Contact.
- Approved meeting minutes from all IBC meetings occurring on or after this date must be posted publicly on an institutional website. Minutes are to be posted immediately after approval and once all appropriate and allowable redactions have been made.
