NIH's Requirement to Use SciENcv for Biographical Sketch and Current and Pending (Other) Support for Due Dates on or after January 25, 2026

See the notice NIH NOT-OD-26-018 for full information and notable changes for the Biographical Sketch and the Current and Pending Support forms: [NOT-OD-26-018: NIHs Implementation of Common Forms for Biographical Sketch and Current and Pending \(Other\) Support for Due Dates on or after January 25, 2026](#)

Use of the Common Forms via SciENcv for Biographical Sketch, Current and Pending (Other) Support and NIH Biographical Sketch Supplement will be required for application due dates and all JIT, RPPR, and Prior Approval submissions on or after **January 25, 2026**.

Note: NIH will enforce the use of the Common Forms via eRA system validations immediately as a warning when the wrong form is used. By February 6, 2026, the warning will be elevated into an error preventing submission of the incorrect or uncertified forms. Failure to utilize the correct forms during the timeframes specified in the table below will cause NIH to withdraw your application from consideration.

NIH anticipates finalizing the templates in SciENcv for Common Forms, the NIH Biographical Sketch Supplement and associated instructions the week of December 15, 2025.

NIH Removal of Requirements for Preapproval for Unsolicited Applications Requesting \$500,000 or More in Direct Costs in Any One Budget Period

NOT-OD-26-019 December 3, 2025

Effective immediately, NIH will no longer require applicants requesting \$500,000 or more in direct costs (excluding consortium F&A costs) in any one budget period to contact the funding Institute or Center (IC) before application submission. In line with this change, applicants are no longer required to include a cover letter identifying the Program Official contact which notes that the IC has agreed to accept assignment of the application.

Responsible Conduct of Research

As outlined in [University SAP 15.99.99.M0.04](#), RCR training is required for students and postdocs participating in research. **Please note that it is the responsibility of each College/School (with support/information from individual PIs) to ensure that all students and postdoctoral researchers associated with them are compliant with the RCR training requirements.**

RCR College Reports were sent out the week of December 3 – this is an excellent time to ensure your students and postdocs have completed their required RCR training.

ALL students and postdocs participating in research are required to complete online [CITI RCR Training](#). Additionally, externally funded graduate students and all postdoctoral fellows must complete four (4) hours of face-to-face (F2F) training. This training requirement can be met through the following F2F training opportunities:

- January 8, 2026 (10:00am-2:30pm) - [RCR Face-to-Face Training](#) (In Person – must attend all 4 hours) – Includes Research Data Management, Research Security, Safe Research Environments, and Research Misconduct, Authorship & Peer Review

- April 8, 2026 (10:00am-11:00am) – [RCR Export Controls](#) (Virtual)

NSF RCR Training Requirement Updates

On June 30, 2025, the NSF published Important Notice No. 149: Updates to NSF Research Security Policies which updated the training requirements for Responsible and Ethical Research Training to include Export Controls and Research Security training. Individuals participating on or paid by NSF funded projects are required to complete online CITI RCR training, as well as TrainTraq courses 2111212 (Export Controls) and 2114875 (Research Security) to meet NSF RCR training requirements. This requirement became effective December 2, 2025. Contact RCR@tamu.edu with any questions.

Huron COI Tip: High Risk Activities & Pre-Approval Requests – (2nd reminder)

Many activities that involve individuals who are affiliated with entities located in countries that are considered high risk fall under [System Regulation 15.05.04](#) and require additional review and approval. Please visit our [website](#) for more information.

Entities on the [Risk-Based-List.xlsx](#) are located in the Countries of Concern and are subject to at least one U.S. government restricted list. Collaborations with these entities are likely to be denied. Note that the list is subject to change at any time.

Submitting a Pre-Approval Request (PAR) in the [Huron](#) system is often the way to initiate an activity that falls under this System Regulation. (Activities that are submitted through other systems of record such as MAESTRO and EMBURSE do not usually require an additional PAR.) Keeping Your Disclosure Profile and Pre-Approval Request Information Up to Date in Huron

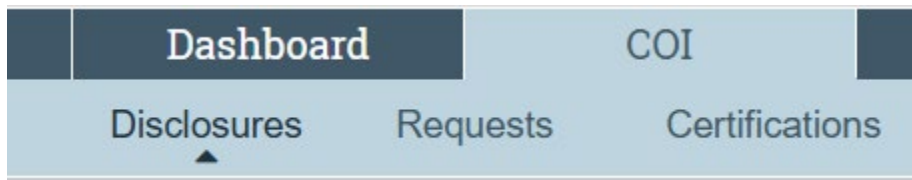
Keeping your Disclosure Profile and Pre-Approval Request information up to date in Huron can assist in expediting reviews.

- Information on the Disclosure Profile's Entity Disclosure Table should reflect the previous twelve-months. Once the disclosure falls out of that lookback period, it can and should be removed from the Table, so that reviewers are only looking at the most recent and relevant information. Huron will save the entry, but it will not be displayed on the forward-facing version of the Disclosure Profile.
- Pre-Approval Requests must be updated annually. If an activity is discontinued, the request documentation should be marked complete. Any compensation etc. that is received from the pre-approved activity should remain on the Entity Table for one year. If the activity will continue, then a new Pre-Approval Request should replace the old one.

*NOTE: Pre-Approval Requests for High-Risk Global Engagements and International Collaborations should remain on the Disclosure Profile for the lifetime of the activity.

System Regulation 15.05.04 High Risk Global Engagements and High-Risk International Collaborations

Please note [System Regulation 15.05.04](#) was updated November 4, 2025. The corresponding University Rule updates are currently in process; however, a few items to note are included below:

- Professional travel to Countries of Concern (COC) has been removed as a general prohibition. Please remember any professional travel to a country of concern will continue to require prior approval.
- Activities involving an entity in Russia will no longer be an automatic denial and will now go through the 15.05.04 prior approval process.
- New requirement that requires all institutional gifts from a Country of Concern to be reviewed pursuant to 15.05.04.
- Note edits to definitions include:
 - Foreign Persons – edited to also include “foreign source” pursuant to Texas Education Code Section 3, Subtitle A, Chapter 51B.
 - High Risk International Collaborations – edited to include professional travel to a Country of Concern.

Updated Process for making Personnel Changes to Approved Studies

The process for submitting personnel changes to an approved study in Huron has been updated. A revised IRB study protocol is now required alongside the personnel change request to support any modification to study personnel. Revising the protocol is necessary to ensure consistency between the study protocol and the Huron IRB application.

BIOSAFETY UPDATES

Planning a Field Release of Transgenic Plant Materials? Here's What You Need to Know

Principal Investigators conducting field trials with transgenic plant materials must comply with both USDA APHIS Biotechnology Regulatory Services (BRS) requirements and Texas A&M University protocols. These safeguards ensure environmental safety, regulatory compliance, and institutional accountability.

USDA Requirements

Before initiating a field release, researchers must:

- Obtain a **USDA APHIS BRS permit or notification** (<https://www.aphis.usda.gov/biotechnology/biotechnology-permits-notifications>) authorizing the release of genetically engineered organisms.
- Comply with all terms and conditions outlined in the permit, including containment, monitoring, and reporting obligations.
- Maintain records and ensure all personnel involved understand and follow USDA restrictions.

Texas A&M Requirements

To align with institutional policies, PIs must:

- Complete the **AG-719 Transgenic Field Trial Certification Form** (<https://agrilifeas.tamu.edu/documents/ag-719.pdf/>), which affirms compliance with USDA permits and university agreements.
- Attach a copy of the USDA permit or notification to the form.
- Submit the form with any Task Order or Service Agreement involving transgenic field trials.
- Ensure all participating faculty, staff, students, and visiting scholars are trained on the applicable requirements.
- Address any export control considerations before involving international collaborators.

The form also requires signatures from the PI and their unit/department head and is reviewed by AgriLife Risk and Compliance and the Office of Biosafety.

Why It Matters

Field releases of transgenic materials are subject to federal oversight and public scrutiny. Proper documentation and adherence to protocols protect your research, uphold institutional integrity, and support Texas A&M's leadership in agricultural biotechnology.

The catalog is designed to **boost the visibility** of completed research projects, **facilitate collaboration**, and **strengthen compliance** with federal and institutional data sharing requirements. It centralizes key metadata about closed research projects making it easier for others to discover your work through improved search engine visibility and integration with your **Scholars@TAMU** profile.

In this first phase, we're focusing on **federally sponsored TAMU research projects**. Our team of expert Research Librarians will reach out to PIs on projects completed between **2021 and 2025** to help you:

- Verify and enrich your project details (pulled from Maestro).

 - Report where your final research datasets are stored — *a required step in meeting federal and institutional data stewardship requirements.*

New Maestro Research Data Deliverable - Effective December 1, 2025

To further streamline **Research Data Management and Sharing (DMS)** compliance, a **new Research Data Deliverable** will be implemented in **Maestro** for all new **TAMU Federal Awards**, beginning **December 1, 2025**.

- **Due Date:** Aligned with submission of the **final financial report**
- **Deliverable Content:** Key details about your dataset—its title, description, storage location, access details, and security measures.

This new deliverable ensures the university can effectively track where final research data are stored and verify compliance with institutional and federal retention and sharing requirements.

Watch for an email from your **Research Librarian** and take a few minutes to work with them on your project metadata and to share where your final research datasets are stored.

Executive Order GA-48 – (Year-End & Final Reminder Notice)

Governor Abbott issued [Executive Order GA-48](#) on November 19, 2024, “relating to the hardening of state government.” Under this order, State agencies and institutions of higher education, including Texas A&M University, are required to implement measures to safeguard employees, critical infrastructure, and sensitive information from access by foreign entities deemed to pose significant risks to the state. Currently, this applies to the following countries: China, Cuba, Iran, North Korea, Russia, and the Maduro Regime of Venezuela. Restrictions were placed on certain activities, such as gifts, professional travel, and participation in foreign recruitment programs, as well as a personal travel notification requirement and the establishment of minimum qualifications for critical infrastructure positions. Implementation Update: Common Forms for Biographical Sketch and Current and Pending (Other) Support – (2nd Reminder)

- NIH's adoption of the Common Forms (originally scheduled for May 25, 2025) will go into effect January 25, 2026.
- On or before September 15, NIH will launch preview versions of the NIH Common Forms within SciENcv (NOT-OD-25-152):
 - These "preview forms" are not final or official versions but are meant to provide users with the opportunity to view the new system functionality and instructions.
 - Data entered in these preview forms will be deleted and no longer accessible when the official NIH Common Forms become available (anticipated November 2025).

REMINDER: Continue to use NIH-specific format pages. Failure to use the required forms or format pages may cause NIH to withdraw your application from consideration.

NIH Limits Number of Applications per Principal Investigator Per Calendar Year – (2nd Reminder)

NIH has issued NOT-OD-25-132, **Supporting Fairness and Originality in NIH Research Applications**. This policy is effective for applications submitted to the **September 25, 2025, receipt date and beyond**. NIH is providing guidance to researchers on the appropriate usage of artificial intelligence (AI) to maintain the fairness and originality of NIH's research application process. **NIH is also instituting a new policy limiting the number of applications that NIH will consider per Principal Investigator per calendar year.**

Policy: NIH will not consider applications that are either substantially developed by AI, or contain sections substantially developed by AI, to be original ideas of applicants. If the detection of AI is identified post award, NIH may refer the matter to the Office of Research Integrity to determine whether there is

research misconduct while simultaneously taking [enforcement actions](#) including but not limited to disallowing costs, withholding future awards, wholly or in part suspending the grant, and possible termination.

NIH will only accept six new, renewal, resubmission, or revision applications from an individual Principal Investigator/Program Director or Multiple Principal Investigator for all council rounds in a calendar year.

This policy applies to all activity codes except T activity codes and R13 Conference Grant Applications. Based on recent data, this limit will affect a relatively small number of Principal Investigators while enabling the NIH to maintain consistently high-quality grant application review and appropriately steward taxpayer dollars.
